Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act Brings the Largest Federal Investment in Public Transit in History

On November 6, 2021, Congress passed the bipartisan infrastructure law called the *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act*. In total, the law provides \$89.9 billion in guaranteed funding for public transit over the next five years — the largest Federal investment in public transit in our country's history. The legislation will expand public transit options across every state in the country, replace thousands of aging transit buses with clean, zero-emission vehicles, and improve accessibility for the elderly and people with disabilities.

The RTA region is expected to receive more than \$3.5 billion. Pace has numerous capital infrastructure projects in the pipeline that this investment will accelerate, including the transition

to a zero-emission fleet, new Pulse rapid transit lines along 95th Street and Halsted Street, and technology enhancements for fixed route and ADA Paratransit services. The transportation landscape is changing, and our capital infrastructure program will power Pace as we reimagine our transit system to meet the new needs of our region and bring people back to public transportation.

This opportunity will help Pace provide a truly equitable, efficient and environmentally sound transit system. We are grateful to our representatives in Congress, all of whom voted in favor of the bill.

Pace Begins Journey to Zero Emissions

Public transportation is actively engaged in emissions reductions and environmental stewardship. According to APTA, the "leverage effect" of public transportation reduces the nation's carbon emissions by 37 million metric tons annually — equivalent to the electricity used by 4.9 million households.

Every time a Pace bus picks someone up, we are taking a car off the road. Every time we take a car off the road, we reduce pollution. The average bus trip produces 33% fewer emissions per passenger mile than a comparable car trip; at rush hour, the savings increase to 82% with a full bus.

In 2021, a major achievement for our agency and our region was the publication of our new strategic vision plan, *Driving Innovation*, which included a commitment to a zero-emission bus fleet by 2040. As our state and nation prioritize climate stewardship, we look forward to working with government officials to secure the infrastructure funding to make this plan a reality.

In 2022, Pace will begin electric vehicle demonstrations and invest \$10 million in an electric bus pilot in Waukegan, which includes the conversion of Pace North Division to an electric charging station and the purchase of at least six electric buses. Pace has also applied for a federal grant that could provide additional funding for electric buses.

These efforts will ensure Pace's transition to zero-emissions is done thoughtfully, without service disruptions, all while remaining a good steward of the taxpayer dollar. Learn more about Pace's future plans in the agency's new strategic vision plan, *Driving Innovation*.



How to Ride Safe During the Winter Months

Using public transportation during the winter months can be stress-free with a little preparation. Pace's safe and reliable service connects you with where you need to go, but inclement weather can add challenges, including longer trip and wait times. With that in mind, please consider these helpful tips when traveling with us.

Avoid Unnecessary Travel

During extreme cold or inclement weather, avoid travel unless you must make an essential trip. If you use ADA Paratransit service, use TripCheck to cancel your reservation as soon as possible if you decide not to travel.

Plan Extra Time for Your Commute

It is always a good idea to allow extra time for your commute, especially during heavy snow and ice. Expect delays as buses may fall behind schedule due to the weather and its effects on traffic and road conditions.

Plan Ahead

Make sure to confirm that your destination is open to avoid making unnecessary trips.

Be Cautious When Waiting for the Bus

While waiting for your bus to arrive, please wait where you are safe from traffic and where the bus driver can see you. Avoid standing too close to the curb as it is always dangerous, but even more so during inclement weather. DO NOT stand in the street and avoid stepping on ice.

Remember to Dress Warm

What you wear can make a difference on how the cold weather affects you. We recommend you dress in layers. Watch the local news to stay up to date with the weather forecast.

When the Bus Arrives

Wait until the bus has come to a complete stop before boarding. Melting snow and ice can make the floors in the bus slippery. Please hold on to handrails when boarding and exiting the bus.

Pace Celebrates 10-Year Anniversary of Bus on Shoulder

On November 15, 2021, Pace celebrated the 10-year anniversary of its bus on shoulder service. Since state law was changed in November 2011, which gave permission to Pace buses to bypass stalled traffic on the shoulder of I-55, more than 4 million trips have been provided on the I-55 express routes and ridership grew 600% in the first seven years since the operational change was implemented.

The phenomenal success of the I-55 bus on shoulder service led to the creation of the "flex lane" on I-90, which similarly allows Pace buses to bypass slow traffic in a bus-only lane in the northwest suburbs, as well as a bus-only shoulder on I-94/Edens Expressway on the north shore. An additional flex lane is in the works as part of the ongoing reconstruction of I-294/Tri-State Tollway.
