Public Hearings on Proposed Fare Reduction

As part of a 6-month fare pilot project that started in December 2021, Pace continued to accept the 7-Day and 30-Day CTA/Pace passes at the reduced prices that were implemented by the CTA as part of their 2022 budget. Pace is now proposing to permanently accept the reduced prices of those passes, and is holding public hearings on that subject. See the dates and times of hearings below.

Additionally, to encourage the use of services provided by Pace, Metra, and the CTA, the following fare changes are also being proposed:

PACE PUBLIC HEARINGS SCHEDULE

With the proposed lowering of the Metra Link-Up pass price to \$30, which is the same price as the Pace PlusBus pass, and with the proposed acceptance of the Metra Link-Up pass anytime on both CTA and Pace, the Pace PlusBus pass is proposed for discontinuation.

Zero Emission Transition Update

After our Board's approval in March, Pace officially ordered 20 Proterra ZX5 Max electric transit buses. This \$26 million order was purchased off the State of Georgia's existing contract with manufacturer Proterra. Our ability to tag onto that existing contract allowed Pace to expedite the procurement process, putting us ahead of our own schedule. We expect to have the first vehicles in operation by 2023.

We will continue to keep you posted as this historic project moves forward! The Pace team is very excited to move our agency into the era of electrification.

Pulse Dempster Line Under Construction **PULSE**



Pace's second Pulse line will operate on Dempster Street between Evanston and O'Hare International Airport. Connections to other Pace and CTA bus routes, the CTA Yellow, and Purple lines, as well as to Metra's Union Pacific North, Northwest, and North Central Service rail lines will provide passengers with a variety of local and regional travel options.



Pulse Dempster Line will be our second rapid transit line. It will operate on Dempster Street between Evanston and O'Hare International Airport. Connections to other Pace and CTA bus routes, the CTA Yellow and Purple lines, as well as to Metra's Union Pacific North, Northwest, and North Central Service rail lines will provide passengers with a variety of local and regional travel options.

Pulse buses make limited stops at special raised stations to speed up service, and even use technology to decrease time spent at red

lights. Other amenities like heated shelters and bus tracker signage further enhance riders' experience. This fast, frequent, reliable, and modern bus service—focused on key corridors truly competes with car travel and will draw new riders to our system.

Station work is also beginning, with a formal groundbreaking ceremony soon to follow. Above is a map of the forthcoming Pulse Dempster Line and image of the ongoing work at one of the station sites
