Pace is actively supporting two significant projects to foster equitable development and enhance transit options. In collaboration with the Chicago Department of Planning and Development, CTA, and Far South Side community groups, Pace is developing strategies for equitable Transit-Oriented Development along 95th Street. Also, with the Regional Transportation Authority, Pace is engaging communities between Harvey and Chicago Heights as part of the Far South Halsted Corridor Study to improve and expand transit services, including Pulse.

Students Help Shape Pulse Cermak Line

High school students in northeastern Illinois often rely on public transit. To understand their needs and how Pulse can help, Pace held focus groups with J. Sterling Morton High School students in Berwyn and Cicero to develop a vision for the Pulse Cermak Line.

PULSE CERMAK LINE Takes Shape

The Pulse Cermak Line is currently in the Project Definition phase, a crucial step in determining preliminary station locations, transit priority features, and service plans. The Cermak Line is anticipated to provide service between the CTA Pink Line 54th/Cermak Station in Cicero and Yorktown Center in Lombard.

Similar to other Pulse Lines, Pace aims for the Cermak Line to arrive every 15 minutes or better for most of the day, giving you more freedom to get where you need to go, when you need to go. Additional local bus service will also operate on the corridor.

During this phase, Pace continues to engage municipalities, agencies, and community groups, as well as the Corridor Advisory Group (CAG). The CAG consists of elected officials, municipal staff, local community groups, transportation agencies, and businesses. The CAG has been key in identifying transit needs and challenges, as well as potential station locations.

Pace recently received Invest in Cook funding for the Cermak Line's environmental review. Meaningful investments in public transportation are critical to our efforts to reduce travel times and improve regional mobility.






Next up is an in-depth review of potential environmental impacts. This essential step is required for the project to receive federal funding and will evaluate potential environmental, social, and economic impacts as the project's design is advanced. Public meetings will also be held during this phase of the project.

Pace will also begin working to secure federal, state, and local funding for future phases of the Pulse Cermak Line. Government funding is essential to helping Pace innovate and improve services.



Push Pace Ridership Growth

Pace's system carried approximately 1.8 million riders in June and just under 2 million riders in July, which is the second highest month over the past 12 months. The Pulse Milwaukee and Dempster Lines have played a big part in that story. Average weekday ridership on the Pulse Milwaukee and Dempster Lines is growing faster than the overall Pace fixed-route bus system. For example, since June 2023 ridership on the Dempster corridor is up 34%! More frequent service and enhanced station features offer riders a better transit experience, helping Pace attract new riders and bring people back to transit.

Community support is crucial to the success of each Pulse Line. The new Pulse addendum to Pace's Transit Supportive Guidelines provides specific recommendations to units of government and private developers for station placement, roadway design, sidewalk configuration, and other surrounding improvements. DESIGNING THE PULSE 95th Street and Halsted Lines


